A Team Approach...

Families, consultants. and staff together school determine and develop supports through a plan of action called Individualized Support Plan (ISP). The ISP document identifies the strengths and needs child and indicates accommodations and modifications child's programming. for Programming varies from child to child and may include:

- support from an educational assistant in completing classroom and daily living tasks in ECS, preschool/playschool or Family Resource Network settings.
- specific interventions carried out daily in individual or small group settings
- reinforcement of specific interventions during classroom activities
- consultation sessions with relevant professionals such-as speech and language, occupational therapy, physical therapy, and/or behaviour specialists.

Program Unit Funding



Program Unit Funding (PUF) is provided to school authorities for ECS children with severe disabilities. It is available for a maximum of two years for eligible children less than 4 years and 8 months September Eligible age on 1st. children receive additional educationally services relevant supports and that vary depending on the individual needs of a child.





Information and documentation from professional specialists must be completed and submitted to the BTPS Department of Inclusive Learning. Documentation must suggest a severe/profound disability in one or more areas of development. Functional levels in early learning settings are also considered in determining eligibility. All documentation must comply with the criteria determined by Alberta Education. For assessment information please contact your local health care providers such as a pediatrician, an Alberta Health Services Rehabilitation Team Walk In Clinic, or Mental Health.



How can I become involved?

Families are valuable team members and are welcome and encouraged to attend the visits from professional consultants such as speech and language pathologists, occupational therapists, physical therapists, and executive functioning specialists who work with PUF children. This is optional, but the knowledge and perspective that families bring can be very valuable in programming and assist ensuring developmental growth in a child. Such input can help develop programming needs, establish programming goals, build and relationships to help create a supportive and caring team around early learners.
