
BTPS WOMEN IN LEADERSHIP BOOK STUDY




DRAFT CURRICULUM VIRTUAL ENGAGEMENT SESSIONS

From January 31 to February 28, virtual engagement sessions will be held for each subject area and the draft social studies design blueprint. There are sessions in all 5 regions to ensure we can hear diverse viewpoints from people across the province.

Participants will receive an overview presentation about the draft K-6 curriculum before breaking into small group conversations facilitated by an independent engagement specialist.
